Learning to take on challenges

Challenges are the pathway to growth. When our children habitually avoid challenges, their learning stalls. When they learn to understand, value, and embrace challenge, their learning accelerates. So, helping our children develop a healthy relationship with challenge becomes one of the most important ways we can help them become better learners.

How does your child respond to a challenge?

Does your child avoid a challenge, seeking their "path of least resistance" in learning?

Or do they select the challenges they know they can do? Looking like they are working hard, but secretly avoiding mistakes by not taking on anything too challenging?

Maybe your child takes on challenges because the teacher tells them to. They follow the teacher's instructions and are led through challenging tasks.

Perhaps your child takes on challenges because they need to. They have something they want to achieve, a goal in mind. Their relationship with challenge is born out of necessity so they can reach their goal.

But imagine if your child embraced challenges. In the spirt of John F. Kennedy when he said, "we do these things, not because they are easy, but because they are hard!" Imagine if when they were given the choice of doing something hard, or something easy, they'd choose the more challenging task, because they understood that challenge is the pathway to growth.

Becoming a Skilful Learner

How our children respond to challenges is a key element of what I call Learnership™ – the skill of learning. Learnership is a skill developed over time. It helps our children (and us) to get more out of every learning opportunity. Most importantly, Learnership is something we can teach our children that helps them to thrive both in school and life.

As parents we can help our children on the path to becoming better learners, by helping them develop a healthier and more productive relationship with challenge.

Comfort Zone V's Learning Zone. What's the Difference?

The first step in helping your child develop a healthy relationship with challenge is to teach them the difference between their Comfort Zone and their Learning Zone.

School belonging starts at home

Belonging is a hot topic right now. It's on posters and internet memes, with some schools making it their number one priority. A sense of belonging at school has been linked to many benefits – including better grades, improved physical and mental health, and positive outcomes for future education or employment. But what does school belonging mean and what steps can you, as a parent, take to encourage it?

In psychology, a sense of belonging refers to the feeling that you form an integral part of your surroundings. Humans can be highly motivated to seek out a sense of belonging. For many people belonging emerges from relationships and bonds with other people. These bonds come from many sources. Most children first begin to form bonds with their family circle. As they grow up, their social connections expand beyond the household. Naturally, since kids spend a significant portion of their days at school, the school becomes a key environment to form connections and experience feelings of belonging

Benefits of school belonging

The most accepted definition of school belonging comes from psychologists Goodnow and Grady (1993). They describe school belonging as "the extent to which students feel personally accepted, respected, included, and supported by others in the school social environment." Psychologists often view school belonging from an ecological perspective. In other words, multiple supports (teachers, parents, peers, etc.) come together to encourage school belonging.

Overall wellbeing, academic achievements, better physical and mental health, and increased self-esteem are often cited as benefits of school belonging. Similarly, prosocial behaviours, including participation in classroom and extracurricular activities, have been reported in students who feel connected to their schools. School belonging can also have the potential to prevent negative outcomes such as school dropout, low academic achievement, low self-esteem, behavioural issues, and feelings of anxiety and loneliness.

Now that we've established the importance of school belonging, let's explore the role that parents play. The following suggestions are actions that you can take to support your kid's sense of belonging at school.

Offer academic support and encouragement

In a 2007 study of American middle school girls, Pauline Garcia-Reid found that parental support is directly related to school engagement. School engagement (e.g., participation in class or extracurriculars) is a facilitator of school belonging. The students in Garcia-Reid's study who reported higher levels of supportive parental behaviours were more positively engaged in school.

Examples of academic support and encouragement include having regular conversations about school, classes your kid is taking, and plans for the future. These conversations can help nurture a desire to engage and achieve at school and inspire plans for higher education.

Get involved




CHILDREN'S LITURGY PROGRAM - we need more volunteers!!

Lenten Theme 2023 - Let's open our hearts and let God in Week 2

The first reading (from Genesis) demonstrates God's covenant relationship of love and care for Abram and his ongoing family. This forges an identity over generations as God's "chosen" and "blessed" people and God-loving nation. The Responsorial Psalm highlights the divine nature of God intimately expressed through God's love, justice, help and mercy. The relationship is mutual. Humans will reciprocate through building a sense of trust, hope and confidence in the



Lord. Saint Paul's letter to Timothy further reminds followers of the unearned gift of God's love revealed as God's saving power over death. Aspiring to be like Christ can also be challenging, involving bearing hardships while endeavouring to be holy and to spread the Good News! The gospel (from Matthew) features the Transfiguration story when Jesus and his selected disciples - Peter, James and John - climb the mountain to be alone and to escape being pursued by the mob. Unexpectedly, they all get a glimpse of Jesus who is acclaimed as the Son of Man, the Beloved and Favoured One and who is revealed in radiant glory. The apostles are asked by God to "listen to him". They also witness Jesus talking to the prophets Moses and Elijah within the dazzling vision.

Some themes:

- God's strong desire is to be in a covenant relationship of love with all of humanity.
- Identifying with prophets who never abandon the covenant. Benedictine Leader, Sr Joan Chittister, notes that the story takes place on the rocky, rugged, dangerous cliffs of Mt Tabor which is "not on the way to anywhere". Conscious that Moses led God's people out of oppression and revealed God's law of right relationships and Elijah (typically accused as a troublemaker by King Ahab) showed how not to follow false gods, Sr Joan encourages the reader (like Jesus) to go back down the mountain to the fray, to the "throngs of hurting people" and be prophetic in our own lives.

- Jesus the Christ is affirmed as the Son of Man the promised Messiah or "anointed one".
- Jesus reveals that he will rise from the dead.

Suggestions:

- Take time to stop and to listen to Jesus' word through scripture and prayer
- To appreciate being able to stop and reflectively bask in the warm sunlight
- Endeavour to be authentic in every relationship
- Mutual love and care for one another are integral to relationships
- Little acts of kindness will help to bring a glimpse of hope to others on a daily basis
